Ask the Realtor – Should I finish my basement?

Blueberries and peaches are in full flavor this month. Apples in the fall. Pick your own or visit the farm's store. Family owned and operated since 1981 they also offer field trips for the younger students in the fall.

Belkin Family Lookout Farm – lookoutfarm.com 89 South Pleasant St, Natick MA,508-651-1539 Lookout farm has the traditional peaches, apples and pumkins, but they also offer plums and pears. In addition to the picking, there are activities for the kids. Ride a train through the orchard, play in the Childrens Play area, climb a hay pyramid or find your way through the farm maze.

Apples, blueberries, cherries, pumpkins, strawberries, peaches, this place has it all. Try some of their fresh baked pies, shortcake or cider donuts! And yes, there is an animal farm for the little ones, boasting over 70 farm animals.
